 - Neuropsychology (child, adult, or lifespan)




ROLES OF A PSYCHOLOGIST








RESEARCH DIFFERENT PROGRAMS

- Take time to really research programs
 - Identify possible major professors
 - All about FIT
 - APA accreditation







TAKE THE GRE (GENERAL AND PSYCHOLOGY)

- General GRE offered throughout the year
- Psych GRE offered only on specific dates
- GRE scores help you decide for which programs you may be competitive

OBTAIN LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION



Submit three letters

Try to have at least one writer with a Clinical Psychology PhD

Most impressive letters say more than how well you did in a class




Ask for letters EARLY

Give letter writers your CV, personal statement, list of programs, and deadlines

Be appreciative and nice ©





 Tailor your statement to each program and professor

Describe:

- Your research interests identify research mentors
- Your fit with a faculty mentor and the training model
- Highlight your strengths and your achievements
- Be careful about any personal information you share



- Master's Degree- clinically focused (primarily self funded, loans, limited fellowships)

- PhD- clinically focused (most offer at least partial stipends, some offer additional support)
- PhD- research focused (primarily university funded, additional support)

Opportunities for predoctoral and dissertation

- Pre-Doctoral: Annual stipend of \$27,000 for 3 years
- Dissertation Award: One year with \$25,000 award
- 9 month or 12 month packages

Predoctoral Fellowship (3 years of support)

Mentoring, travel support, training opportunities, internship application support, potential dissertation support



Postdoctoral Fellowship (2 years of support)

Mentoring, travel support, training opportunities, access to information and resources





Predoctoral Fellowship- (3 to 5 years of support)

- \$20,000 stipend for 3 years
- Tuition expenses
- Conference travel

Postdoctoral Fellowship- (1 year of support)

\$20,000 stipend for 1 years

\$500 for research and professional development

Tuition expenses
